Letter from the Editor

Japan is a land of changes. Sudden, catastrophic events such as earthquakes, volcano eruptions and tsunamis has been ingrained deeply in the national psyche, and perhaps it is because of this that nobody flinches an eye when the changes are more gradual and measured. If somebody who visited Kobe 50 years ago visits Kobe now, I wonder whether the visitor will recognize the city as the same Kobe he/she visited half a century ago.

The street car network has been replaced by bus. A subway system has emerged, connecting the newly developed residential area in west and north Kobe with the city center. 2 man-made islands and an airport have emerged, and the area around Sannomiya station has completely transformed itself.

An institution familiar to many of us, Kobe YMCA was located on a site currently occupied by Kobe Tax Office and Ikuta Police, not too far away from St. Michael's. In 1972, it was relocated to the Kano-cho site, between Sannomiya and Shin Kobe stations. 42 years later, in 2014, it was relocated again, this time to a site not too far away from HAT Kobe.

The gradual change of Kobe can be contrasted with the constance that is Europe. Upon visiting my university over the summer, I find that so little has changed over time. King's College, Elphinstone Hall, New Kings, Taylor Building, Crombie and Johnston Hall, Meston Building are exactly as I remember them. But this is a university that has been ongoing since 1495, and changes are measured over centuries than years.

What about St. Michael's? This is an institution that has been a constant feature of the international community in Kobe since its inception in 1946, and survived the 1995 earthquake intact. The visitors from 50 years ago will have no trouble locating and recognizing this small part of Kobe, so in a way, emanates the quality of a European academic institution. Considering the backdrop of changes that Kobe and Japan has gone through during these years, it is nothing short of amazing that the school has been able to stand for so long. With your help, the school will be able to continue serving the international community of Kobe for many years to come.

In the run-up to the 70th anniversary, the school will be embarking on a major structural refurbishments to the building, so the school can continue to serve the international community of Kobe at its current site 30, 50, and 70 years from now. To go with the refurbishment work, the school board is in the final stages of planning a capital campaign. The *tokuzo* status announced in the last issue of The Breeze is part of this, and The Breeze will be looking forward to providing the readers with the details of the planned work and the capital campaign at the next issue of The Breeze.

What Do SMIS Staff Do All Day?

The answer is MANY, MANY THINGS! My name is Naoko Kimura, and after working here for the 7th year I am still amazed at the variety of jobs we juggle with every day! St. Michael's International School is a very special and diverse environment with primary children from all over the world and adults from all walks of life eager to learn English, so our roles and activities also naturally vary. The Office is probably one of the most 'bilingual' spaces in the entire school, too!

Our day-to-day services cater to current children, parents, new families considering our school, newly arrived and returning staff, Board & Council members, companies that provide us with various services, companies that provide donations, friendship schools and last but not least to the Head of School and other key staff.

Each of our office staff have their own job descriptions - Kazumi Koseko takes care of the financial book-keeping, tuition fees, salaries as well as maintaining the school building. Sachiko Namao handles the day-to-day management of the IS section such as the school bus, clubs, school lunch, sending letters home, management of Parent Teacher conference schedules and school outings. She is also in charge of ordering and distributing school supplies. Sayuri Terada handles all administrative matters and day-to-day management pertaining to the ELS section and ELS admissions. This includes book-keeping, communicating to staff and students and ordering teaching supplies. She also assists many of the administrative tasks for the IS section. I assist the Head of School, Gill Tyrer in administration, school communications and coordinating International School admissions, from initial enquiries to the first-day-of-school.

There is also the Medical Office where Nurse Setsuko Morimoto takes care of general and immediate medical needs of children, staff and families, but I am sure that will require a whole other article! She has regular little visitors to her Medical Office everyday. Last but not least, Mitchan has been part of the Office Staff since 1964 and takes care of the school environment so staff and students can be safe and happy. She is one of the oldest working members at the school and remembers everybody who was connected to St. Michael's, so if you ever come back to visit please make sure you see her!

Besides the above summary of our job descriptions we all share in the more general tasks of taking phone calls, attending to enquiries at the front desk and attending to immediate needs of the children and staff, making sure we know which adult is responsible for students safe commute to and from school.

Some days are more eventful than others - small things from children forgetting their lunch, or an adult not showing up at a designated place to pick up their child, to air conditioning breaking down on an especially hot day! Or slightly bigger things like the typhoon affecting the school. Some

things are seasonal, such as welcoming the school community to school events or getting ready for the Bazaar. Some days can be so busy it makes our heads spin but somehow we get through, thanks to the cool heads and warm hearts of this really great team. I am sure this school will continue to be diverse and our tasks will continue to be varied, but we sure hope we are meeting the needs of the school community.
